The First Fleeters' Co-operative Society is currently making a drive to expand the list of shareholders.

The road from the new Webb's Creek bridge to our land is rapidly approaching completion, and accordingly we propose to hold a picnic on your land in the near future.

Within a reasonable period of time we propose to build facilities on your land so that all can enjoy the delights of the Hawkesbury River. While very handy to the city, your land is set in a Flora and Fauna Sanctuary, among tall natural Australian trees on the banks of the Hawkesbury River in the Lower Half Moon Reach region. Incidentally, in the olden times, a person could embark from this region on a sailing vessel, sail around the world and return to his home there (as did T. Chaseling in 1830).

New shareholders are needed to help us develop your land in the way in which it should be developed.

Membership Committee

First Fleeter who died in 1850 or later. John Small died in October 1850, but there may be others who lived longer.

There were a number of children who set sail in the First Fleet and others were born on the voyage, so if they lived longer than 62 years they could well be the last. If you know any of these people, please write to Mrs M. Thompson, 1/11 Esther Road, Balmoral Beach 2088.

It is hoped that Family Trees showing at least the first couple of generations of Australian-born children will be compiled by the various families, and further information concerning this will be included in a Newsletter early in the New Year.

Recently Mr Harkness, of Strathfield, who is a descendant of Anthony Rope, drew our attention to the deplorable condition of the old Castlereagh Cemetery. On investigating, we were horrified to find that the tombstones (that is, those which had not been confiscated by some of the local residents) were broken and left scattered about. The greater part of the cemetery was so overgrown by bushes and brambles that identifying the various tombstones was difficult. The Rev Henry Fulton, who was responsible for the education of some of our ancestors, lies in this cemetery without even a headstone. However, many headstones for various members of the Rope family could be identified. The question of neglected cemeteries is one in which we should be involved.

Please let us know if you think your ancestor could qualify as being the last First Fleeter.

Weekend for Descendants of John and Mary Small

The weekend doings for the descendants of John and Mary Small proved highly successful.

Held in fine Spring weather, the picnic at Lane Cove River Park on Saturday 7th October was most enjoyable. There was a good roll-up for the occasion.

On the Sunday, another fine day, a Family Service was held at historic St Anne's Church, Ryde, at 2.30 p.m., and was also well attended. After the service we followed the Parramatta Police Citizens Boys' Club Pipe Band and the Brownies to Addington for afternoon tea.

We had Press coverage on both days, and we saw ourselves at news-time on Sunday night on Channel 2 (at both St Anne's and Addington). I suppose it is because we are such a large family that reports become mixed. As the TV report ended, we were amazed to hear that Rebecca Small, the eldest child, was born at Addington. Small's descendants did not live at Addington till 1900, and Rebecca was born in Sydney on 22nd September 1789 and registered at St Philip's.

Such information was collected by Miss Beryl Bridle and Mrs Flo Denning, also by Miss Priscella Deck and Miss Betty Willis. We had on display their large album of photographs taken recently. They have been searching for headstones of our ancestors. The family cannot thank them enough for this time-consuming work. We welcome any information concerning the Small family, as there are still many gaps to be filled before the vast third-generation listing is complete. It is interesting that from our first generation of seven children there were 71 descendants to form the second generation, and most of those who married had large families also. We are anxious to find descendants of William Moorhouse Richardson Byrnes, Walter Lawry Byrnes, Samuel St Quentin Byrnes, Mrs Australia Kate Dawson (Byrnes) and Mrs Ida Knox (Byrnes). Contact Mrs J.
