Mr. Des Jurd will be heading a committee which will be formed to carry out this important work.

We hope to enlist the help of members who would be prepared to act as CUSTODIANS OF FIRST FLEETER GRAVE, and report back to Mr. Jurd twice a year, so that we may keep a check on these tombstones. The custodian is only asked to report on the condition of the tombstone, which would not be a very onerous task. At a later date we hope to place plaques on these graves, showing that these people were First Fleeters.

Nothing to Apologise For

Members may be interested to know that Arthur Griffiths, travel editor of a U.S. newspaper "Sunday Bulletin", referred to First Fleeters in an article in that paper on 21st January, 1973, dealing with the tourist attractions of Sydney. Here are some relevant extracts:-

"We get on the subject of Australian History. "It's terrible to think Australia got a start as a penal colony, said one" (chance acquaintances in a pub.) "We've got nothing to apologise for," said another, explaining to me that the equivalent of our Mayflower Society. I tried to soften history by supposing some of the First Fleeters were political prisoners. No petty thieves and poachers, he said. England began shipping them to Australia when she lost America. I had a recommendation to dine at the nearby Argyle Tavern, once a prison, now a fashionable spot for dinner. I couldn't help wondering if I were sitting among some First Fleeters."
