A few notes on a new First Fleeter ANDREW FISHBURN - Marine. He was employed for 101 days from May to September in 1788 in building the Commanding Officer's House, and the barracks etc. for the Officers and men of the detachment.

By 1791 he was at Norfolk Island and was a prominent member of a group of marines who refused to take their food rations because they had been reduced in quantity. Major Ross's strong measures prevented the mutiny but Andrew and his six companions were fortunate to survive the episode. He died in 1796 at Parramatta 23rd July 1796. His son was later a well known police constable at Castle Hill.
