First Fleet Exhibition

The Australia Day Festival in the Rocks area will be held again next year on the Monday of the Australia Day weekend, 27th January, and we have been again invited to participate. (All our ancestors lived at least for a short time in the Rocks area).

At this exhibition we are hoping to depict the first few years of the colony. The accent will be on people. What they wore, what they did, what they ate, in fact how they survived during those rugged years.

By the next Lecture Night (11th June) we hope to have photocopies which will show the style of clothing our ancestors wore, together with information concerning materials, etc. The styles should be quite easy to copy.

Regarding the men's costumes, these can be quite varied because we have marines, sailors and convicts. Just for the record, there was one free man with the fleet, who held no civil or military position because he had stowed away. His name was James Smith. So we can allow one member to dress as an ordinary civilian! In addition there was, of course, the Rev. Richard Johnson (and his wife).

Country members inquiring about costumes could write to me at 1/11 Esther Road, Balnoral Beach 2088, stating whether the costume is for males or females or both.

We are hoping to have all our members' ancestors represented by a Family Exhibit. It is envisaged that each exhibit will give the public some idea of what that particular First Fleeter did after his arrival -- where he lived, and any highlights of his life.

If you can contribute anything at all in this respect, please let us know. One person will be selected from each family to be in charge of the presentation of their Exhibit. Where the information concerning the First Fleeter is scanty, a number of First Fleeters could be combined on the one sheet -- e.g., "The Hawkesbury Settlers" or "The Kissing Point Settlers."

We are hoping that our younger members, as well as coming on costume, may be able to help with the exhibits and make them more colourful and imaginative.

This is the first time that we have had an opportunity of introducing our ancestors to the public. With your co-operation, we hope to make it a great success.
