CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS - A.G.M. 1975.

Rule 25 be amended by adding the following words:-

Rule 28 be amended to read --

The business of the Annual General Meeting shall be:-(a) Consideration of the Executive Committee Report and the Financial Statement of the Fellowship for the year preceding the date of the Heeting.
(b) The transaction of any other business provided for

in the Rules.

(c) The Election of Officers and the Executive Committee.

(d) The appointment of an Auditor.
