## Inscription on Governor Phillip's Grave

Mrs I. Pogson, a Member of the Fellowship and an aunt of the President, received from friends recently a copy of the inscription on Governor Phillip's grave. The friends copied last year.

ARTHUR PHILLIP 1738 - 1814

Founder of Australia & First Governor NSW Undeneath Lie the Remains of Arthur Phillip Esq Admiral of the Blue Who died 31st August 1814 In his 76th year.

Alfo of Isabella Relict of the above Admiral Phillip Who died 4th March 1823 In the 7First year of her age.

According to Mrs Pogson's friends, the unusual spellings in some of the words as given above are as appear in the inscription.

#### Derryn John Kable Tunks

The following has been supplied by Mrs Mary Caldwell, a descendant of Henry Kable:

The birth of my grandson may be of interest to First Fleeters. The details are as follows: Derryn John Kable Tunks, born June 18, 1977, to Mary and Phillip Tunks, both Members of the Fellowship.

Little Derryn, like his brother Phillip Jnr and his sister Rebecca, is a 7th-generation Australian on the Kable side and an 8th-generation Australian on the Tunks side.

Phillip is a descendant of Tunks (or Tonks) who came out in the First Flect, and Mary is a descendant of Susannah Holmes and Henry Kable. In the manner of his forebears, little Derryn was born at home.

It may also be of interest to know that the name John has been in the family continually since at least 1780.
