February Lecture Evening

The first Lecture Night for 1981 was a successful evening, with many of our Members attending.

The speaker, Mr Vincent Crow, History Master of St Mary's Cathedræl School, and Research Officer for the Ashfield Historical Society, in 1978 wrote an interesting booklet, "Haberfield, the Development of its Character".

The lecture unfolded with the discovery and settlement of the area later known as Haberfield. In February 1788 Capt. 3. Hunter and

Lieut. P. King journeyed up the Parramatta River and discovered the inlet now known as Iron Cove. In 1803 the area was granted to Lieut. Nicholas Bayley of the N.S.W. Corps. The area comprised 480 acres and was then known as Sunning Hill Farm.

In 1826 Sunning Hill Farm was sold to Simeon Lord for £850. He renamed the property Dobroyde. Lord later gave the property as a dowry to his daughter Sarah Ann and son-in-law Dr David Ramsay. Their contribution to the area was the foundation of a Presbyterian community, and after Dr Ramsay's death Sarah carried out plans for the site of a church, manse, public school and family vault. In 1862 the school was opened named Yasmar (Ramsay spelt backwards). Years later Richard Stanton's Haberfield Estate had the strong impact upon the district's history in the 20th century.

Real estate agent Stanton bought 50 acres and named the estate after his wife's maiden name. The streets in this estate were Turner and Barton Avenues, Forrest, Kingston and O'Connor Streets and Hawthorne Parade, also Dalhousie and the southern side of Waratah Street.

Mr Crow brought slides of the old homes, and described the two major architectural designs of these houses: "The Federation Style" from the English Queen Anne Style revived in Britain in the 1870's by Norman Shaw.

These houses had these characteristics — the roof gabled and highpitched made of slate or terracotta tile; the use of casement windows
and leadlight in the upper part of the door. The main materials
were brick and wood, and the houses were asymmetrical with a
complexity of design. In the late 19th century came nationalism
to the Australian design.

The Rising Sun motif was used in gables: the Australian Army has used the "Rising Sun" emblem since 1904. The Australian Coat of Arms was sometimes depicted in plaster in the central gable. In some houses kookaburras and the waratah are centred in casement windows.

We were shown an A.B.C. film on the subject of the preservation of these historic homes. Mr Crow stated in an A.B.C. interview the importance of the conservation of Haberfield's character. This has been achieved in 19th-century-developed suburbs such as Balmain, Glebe, Hunters Hill and Paddington, where houses not much older than those in Haberfield have been restored.

We wish Vincent Crow luck in his Haberfield crusade, and thank him for giving us a most enjoyable and interesting evening.

Notes from the Library

A recent popular song from Mr Peter Allen should have reminded marmy of the role of Rio in the early voyages to Australia. Whether to catch the trade winds or for reasons of provisions and health, it has been estimated that as many as 70 per cent of the ships on the United Kingdom - Australia run had Rio as a port of call prior to the first decade of the 19th century. From 1789 to 1802 over 2600 Australian "colonists" called at Rio. Dr Rudy Bauss has now examined the Brazilian Archives for the period up to 1805 and has published an article on his findings.

Included as an appendix to the article are translations of the reports and related documents of the Portuguese Board of Enquiry in respect of the First Fleet. This Board examined each foreign arrival, determined its intentions, collected maritime informations and decided the duration of Port Liberty (in the case of the First Fleet, 15 days). It was recorded that on board the frigate ("Sirrius")

there were 209 rank and file, 20 commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the land forces, 600 civilians, 200 women, 160 sailors and 20 marines, and that the whole fleet was bound for "New Wales of the South Seas".

The records also reveal a further facet of the character of Governor Phillip, for Dr Bauss records:

"Phillip had the added advantage of speaking some Portuguese because he captained a Portuguese ship from Lisbon to Rio de Janeiro and took part in naval actions against the Spaniards in southern Brazil from 1774 to 1776. The future governer, therefore, had significant knowledge of the Brazilian coast and an excellent background in dealing with the Portuguese ... some officials knew him. The authorities clearly treated the captain with the utmost deference. The Portuguese were aware that he had fought for their cause a decade before and consequently extended many courtesies to his crew, very rarely granted to foreigners ..."

In addition to these references to the First Fleet mention is also made of a number of other Australian-bound vessels using Rio as a port of call. In particular the sojourn of Philip Gidley King from 25th May to 13th August 1807 is referred to.

As with all works in the Library this article: Rudy Bauss "The Critical Importance of Rio de Janeiro to British Interests, with Particular Attention to Australia in Her Formative Years 1787-1805" Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society (December 1979) Vol. 65 Pt 3 pp 145-172 may be read in, but not removed from, the Fellowship's Room.
