Being the time of the year for Annual Meetings the attention of members is drawn to the Annual Meeting of the Friends of the First Government House Site at which Anne Bickford, the Excavation Director for the First Government House site, shall be speaking. It is important to remember that the site is still unprotected by way of any conservation order, that the dig has now ceased and that the Government has failed to announce any specific proposals. Clearly it is necessary to continue all endeavours to enable a sympathetic utilization of the site.


The attention of all Victorian members is drawn to the establishment of a Victorian Divisional Council of the Fellowship and in particular to its coming activities. This is a most exciting development and one which should greatly facilitate the growth of the Fellowship.

Members may be aware that on 27th February 1984 the Sydney City Council approved the establishment of a Sister City Link with Portsmouth (U.K.). To develop this link a Sister City Committee has been established and the Fellowship has been invited to join this Committee under the chairmanship of Air Vice-Marshal W. Townsend C.B., C.B.E.. The Fellowship has already been instrumental in developing ties with Portsmouth by its benefaction and involvement in the Bonds of Friendship Sculpture at Circular Quay Sydney some years ago. Clearly with Portsmouth being the port from which the First Fleet sailed and Sydney being its destination the links between the two cities are of considerable significance.

OUR FIRST PLAQUE IN ENGLAND

On the outskirts of Worthing, a city on England's south coast, is the lovely old church of St. Mary's, Broadwater. The massive square tower and portion of the nave date back to the twelfth century, and the fine arches, decorated with typical Norman ornamentation, are supported by circular stone columns.



Under these ancient arches, in the aisle of the church, John White, Surgeon General of the First Fleet, was buried in 1832. His grave is marked by a white marble square, the inscription being much worn by the feet of the worshippers in the church during the last 150 years. The Rector and Church Wardens had the Fellowship's plaque attached to the stone pillar nearest to the grave site.

On 10 June 1984, after evensong on Pentecost Sunday, I unveiled the plaque and spoke to the congregation about the life and work of Dr. John White. They were very interested in what I had to say and were eager to ask questions about the people of the First Fleet.

This is the first plaque to be placed on a First Fleeter's grave in England.

A REPORT ON THE LECTURE GIVEN BY MR. BRIAN ROSER

whose hobby is Early Australian Architecture

Who designed the first Government House? – was the first question raised by our speaker. Henry Brewer, the first public servant, a carpenter who had studied architecture and was a skilled draughtsman, most probably drew the plans. He then went on to build the Barracks. It is obvious that James Bloodworth, convict and brickmaker, had the great responsibility of erecting the first Government House, begun in May 1788.

Who loosened the first rock for the foundations? – that was the task of Marine John Brown, a former miner, who was then detailed to work on the cellar – how appropriate!

Where did the ten thousand bricks go, that were brought out on the First Fleet? It was a quite inadequate quantity for a complete house. This question seems to remain unanswered. It was James Bloodworth who made the first bricks. Kilns had to be constructed with 'under-fired' bricks – a remarkable achievement – but by July '88 the quality of the bricks was good and the house was erected to eaves level by September. So much progress had been made by November '88 that a female convict wrote, "Two rows of miserable huts line the shore, but not so the governor's house". At the same time a marine officer wrote, "An elegant house has been built for the governor, who moved in, in the spring". Governor Phillip possibly moved out again when bricks were available for the second storey. Without the bricks made by Bloodworth, the house could not have been built! The first roof had shingles, later replaced by slate tiles, but these were soft due to lack of mills to grind the clay, and were in turn replaced by shingles.

What materials did the First Fleet bring in the Stores? There were 5,000 squares of glass (possibly for casement windows), 74,000 nails (so convict women had to make wooden pegs), 36 mason's chisels, and one brick mould; and possibly fabric for the ceilings?

What has the archaeological dig revealed on the site? The stones found in the pilot dig most probably dated to 1788. Recently they have found the line of the stables (where the trees came down on the footpath), while the cellars still lie concealed beneath Bridge Street.

The greatest monument for 1988 should be the preservation of this site.

After the lecture, Mr. Rod Best proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Roser.

HMAS SYDNEY (IV)

All First Fleeters would have been proud to witness the arrival of the HMAS Sydney (IV) in Sydney Harbour on March 27, 1984. A missile frigate built in Seattle, USA at a cost of \$250M, the Ship of the City arrived home in magnificent early morning weather to slip through the Heads, only to be eyed by 6 television helicopters overhead.

The reason for Fleeters' interest is that the Captain, Commander Paul Kable RAN, was at the helm. He had been in charge of the ship since it was commissioned and had stayed with the vessel since its Seattle launching in 1982.

Excited members of the Kable family were among the crowd that lined the Overseas Terminal at Sydney Cove, to see this small, plain but extremely complex and expensive ship pass around the Opera House in brilliant sunlight to berth at the dock. Many interviews were given by Paul during the progress up the harbour, and after the ship berthed. Newspapers covered the story and that night the ship was seen on national TV. Members of the Kable family boarded the vessel at Sydney to visit the Captain's Lounge for morning tea and then tour the ship.

At 11am the ship's company assembled at the Quay to be led up Pitt St. by Commander Kable bearing a sword. He asked for the rights to the city according to Rules. The police accepted the challenge (a scroll was read) and the ship's company of 185 were able to pass, marching to the Cenotaph, where an impressive speech by Paul was part of a large formal ceremony presided over by the Lord Mayor, Ald. D. Sutherland.

Members of the "HMAS Sydney Association" were present, including a veteran and earlier Commander of HMAS Sydney II – Sir John Collins. The ship's company then marched up George St. to the Town Hall, where the ship was presented with a crystal decanter by the Lord Mayor. Then followed a civic reception for the ship's company, their wives and a few of the Kable family. Probably there has never been such large coverage of any member of the Fellowship as on that day.

Paul Kable is remarkably talented, capable and young for such a position of responsibility. He is a descendant of Henry Kable and Susannah Holmes and proudly advertises the fact. All Fleeters should be very proud to have Paul as a member; he joined the Fellowship in 1970. Henry Kable, Australia's first free enterprising ship builder and owner of 25 sailing ships that sailed the world, would have been very proud, too.

REPORT ON THE MAY LECTURE EVENING

At this meeting we welcomed Mrs. Helen Bersten, archivist to the Jewish Historical Society, who gave a most interesting talk about early Jewish arrivals and the practice of their religion. It was estimated that out of 145,000 convict arrivals between 1788 and 1852, 1000 were Jews and there were 8 to 14 Jews on the First Fleet. Many of the early arrivals married Christians and it was not until 1830 that there was an organized Jewish Religion. The First official Rabbi was Joseph Marcus, a free settler who gave leadership to his people in 1835. A burial society however, had been established in 1817 and even today there is only one, the Chevra Kadisha.

A number of Jewish convicts were sent to Norfolk Island amongst whom were Henry Abrams, convicted of highway robbery, Daniel Daniels, Aaron Davis, who later became a merchant and prospered, David Jacobs who later returned to the colony and died, being buried in St. John's cemetery, Parramatta, Esther Abrahams who arrived with her daughter and became the mistress, later wife of Lieut. George Johnston and resided at Annandale House, John Harris, who became a constable at Norfolk Is., and returned to be granted a full pardon and a grant of land at Windsor. He later returned to England and was not heard of in the colony again.

Sarah Lyons, a convict on the Lady Juliana (Second Fleet), a London Jewess, and thought to have been a descendant of the Sephardi Jews is well known as the "Matriarch" of the numerous Tunks descendants.

We of the Fellowship are indeed grateful to Mrs Helen Bersten for her most stimulating and interesting lecture.

IDENTIFICATION – FRIEND OR FOE?

For most people, an island would be an idyllic place to live; certainly many think of an island as a desirable place for a holiday – 'to get away from it all'.

For the first settlers at Norfolk Island, which included many First Fleeters, the sight of a ship arriving often meant fresh provisions and news of the world beyond their watery horizon. A couple of ships arriving about the same time meant greatly increased activity at the wharf and a change from their everyday routines.

But an island can be very vulnerable to unwelcome visitors and 180 years ago many predators roamed the seas of the world. Imagine how the Norfolk Islanders felt one evening in November 1805, when nine large ships appeared from the south-west and boldly approached the island. Captain Piper, who was in charge at the time, though they were an enemy and immediately took the precaution of locking up all disaffected persons. However, the weather took a hand in the turn of events, and a heavy gale sprang up which certainly prevented the strangers from making a landing. During the night Captain Piper took all precautions against an invasion.

The next morning, the strange fleet sailed round to Cascade Bay, which is the usual procedure at Norfolk Island if the weather is unfavourable at Kingston, then known as Sydney. Captain Piper immediately ordered a Sergeant and twenty men to go to Cascade Bay to prevent a landing and one of the big guns was also hauled to Cascade Bay; not an easy task given the hilly nature of the terrain.

By 7 a.m. the fleet had arrived in Cascade Bay, fired a shot and hoisted the English flag. The Cascade defenders fired a shot in reply and made a signal that a boat be sent to the shore. Nothing further happened for five hours, whilst the apprehensions of the Islanders increased. Everyone believed that the hoisting of the English flag was a decoy and Captain Piper increased the strength of the defenders.

At last a boat was lowered from one of the ships and a party came ashore. They turned out to be the China fleet under the convoy of H.M.S. L'Atheniense. They had lost one of their ships, the Taunton Castle, and had put into Norfolk Island to seek news of her. Some of the officers on L'Atheniense were in ill health, so Captain Piper, who must have been greatly relieved to learn that it was an English convoy, made a present of 12 sheep and two goats from the Government herd and supplied a quantity of lemons. The fleet then departed for the Philippine Islands and three days later the Taunton Castle arrived. After a stay of 48 hours, she sailed after the fleet and presumably the Norfolk Islanders went back to their normal tranquil everyday affairs! (Historical Records of N.S.W., Vol. 5)
