A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FELLOWSHIP OF FIRST FLEETERS.

In 1970 the Fellowship became deeply involved in the Captain Cook Bicentennial Celebrations. We joined the Royal Australian Historical Society and the Society of Australian Genealogists in order to have access to their respective records. In that year also, the Fellowship raised over \$500 for the establishment of a special Australian Chapel in the Parish Church of St. Nicholas, Bathampton, England where Arthur Phillip was laid to rest.

In 1971 three Vice-Patrons were appointed. They were, Arthur Ingham-Meyer, who had established a Chapter in Towoomba Qld, Jack Luscombe, a former Town Clerk of the City of Sydney who had been a great help to us in our formative years and was guest speaker at an early Australia Day Dinner, and my father Dudley Oakes, a foundation member and also a member of the first Committee of the Fellowship.

In 1972 we constituted a Chapter in the Port Macquarie district. President Frank Everingham, Secretary Betty Loneragan and Treasurer Vince Parker, visited the area and held an inaugural meeting with local members. Unfortunately this Chapter folded after two years.

In the same year we also introduced Spouse Membership and Fred Daniell (F.F. William Tunks), became the Fellowship's third President. After only a short time in office, Fred passed away in February 1973 and Edgar Kable (F.F. Henry Kable/Susannah Holmes), was appointed fourth President by the Management Committee. This year, along with our sister body, the 1788-1820 Pioneer Association, we approached the Sydney Cove Development Authority urging that body to restore Cadman's Cottage and naming the nearby park, First Fleet Park, both being adjacent to Circular Quay. The Fellowship is proud of the part it played toward the successful accomplishment of these projects.

Also in 1973 the then Governor, Sir Roden Cutler, accepted the invitation of the Executive to become our first Patron.

The same year, we moved into our first office, a smallish room in the Assembly Hall Building, Margaret St. Sydney.

Moving ahead, the Fellowship commenced a programme of monthly lectures which proved extremely popular and went on for many years. We also commenced participation at the Australia Day festivities at the Rocks, seiling souvenirs and putting forward an interesting story on First Fleeters and their Descendants. The first Hon. Life Member was awarded to the then Archivist Mary Thompson who had been a diligent worker and laid down strong foundations for the membership to build upon.

In 1975 Mrs Beryl Lewis commenced her seven years as President and Edgar Kable was appointed the second Life Member of the Fellowship. It was in this year that we commenced visits to Government House to present the Governor with a Memorial. This ceremony dates back to the very early days of the colony when our pioneer forefathers attended upon the Governor with Petitions and Memorials seeking all manners of favours.

TRIALS OF A FIRST FLEET OFFICER AND HIS FAMILY

John Palmer was born on the 17-6-1760 at Westbourne, England and at the age of 9 years he was taken into the Navy as a Captain's messenger. From the beginning he went on to become a Midshipman. While on the staff of Admiral Digby he served with the then Prince of Wales, who was later to become King William 1V.

As the Captain's clerk on board the H.M.S. Richmond during the War of Independence, John, with the rest of the ship's crew had the misfortune to be captured. The H.M.S. Richmond, together with H.M.S. Iris were engaged in the sabotage of cutting the mooring buoy lines of the French Fleet at Chessapeake Bay whilst they were at sea, making it impossible for them to tie up and so having to anchor in deep water. This meant that the Frenchmen would waste much time in getting the anchors up to give chase to the British.

During the course of his capture in America, John was released and had the good fortune to meet Miss Susan Stilwell, the daughter of a royalist family. They were married in New York on the 2-8-1783. At the conclusion of the war, John and Susan returned to England and in 1786 he was appointed Purser on the H.M.S. Sirius under Captain Phillip and came to Australia in the capacity with the First Fleet.

John served on the Sirius as Purser/Supply Officer for the young colony until 1790 when the ship was wrecked on Norfolk Island. Then at the Governor's request took up the position of Commissary General to the colony of NSW and was formally appointed to that position on 8-3-1791 by King William 1V.

John was granted leave in 1796 to return to England to finalise his affairs in that country. He then returned with his wife and family to Australia on board the H.M.S. Porpoise and settled on his land grant at Wooloomooloo. He had been separated from his wife for 10 years.

The couple had 8 children born to them of which only 3 were to survive infancy. The first, George Thomas was born 26-4-1784. The second, John Westwick was born in 1786 but died during his first year. The third, Henry Westwick was born in September 1787 and died in 1788. John Jnr. was the next on 7-4-1798 after John Snr. returned to England. The next was a stillborn daughter in 1799. Number six, Edmund was born in 1800 on board the H.M.S. Porpoise and died at the Cape of Good Hope a month later. The only son born in Australia, Edwin in 1801, lived 11 months. The final child, a daughter Sophia Susanah born 16-8-1803 was their only surviving female. Mary Catchpole, who came to Australia as a convict, was at one time employed at Wooloomooloo as a wet nurse to one of the children.

When John and Susan came to Australia to settle, John brought with him his brother Christopher and his two sisters Sarah and Sophia, the later who married Robert Campbell (of Duntroon and the Wharf) in 1801. (But that is another story)

John's troubles had not finished with his family. He and Susan were dining with Governor Bligh when the N.S.W. Corps staged their revolt which became known as the "Rum Rebellion". As a result of his part in this and the fact that he refused to release his records to the rebels, he was gaoled for some months and then had to return to England with Governor Bligh as a witness in the Case of Major Johnstone.

In 1826 John took up a land grant at Jerrabombera. The land extended from the river on the west side of Queanbeyan South, to what is now the industrial area of Hume. Like a number of landowners he was an absentee landlord.

John also had land grants at Parramatta and in the Hunter region (The Hunter grant was later exchanged for land at Jerrabombera.)

Susan died in 1832 and John in 1833 (the longest surviving officer of the First Fleet) and are both buried in St. John's graveyard at Parramatta in the family vault which stands beside the Campbell family vault.

PIONEER FAMILY CELEBRATES

Of the many celebrations which took place in the months past, one of the most exciting events was a dinner for some five hundred descendants of Australia's first family, who commemorated the 200th Wedding Anniversary of Henry Kable and Sussanah Holmes. Henry and Sussanah languishing in the grim, derelict goal in Norwich Castle in 1783 could never had imagined that they would marry in the third wedding. ceremony in the far off convict settlement at Sydney Cove, or realize that their eleven children would be the beginning of the first family in the new colony.

Both had been sentenced to hang for their crimes, and both had been reprieved to transportation. Henry, his father and one other Abraham Carman, had robbed a house in Aldburgh near Norwich, of clothing and food to the value of 8.70.0. All were sentenced at Thetford on 18th March 1873 to be hanged. Because of his youth, 19 years, young Henry was reprieved to 7 years transportation, a comparatively light sentence at a time of harsh punishment. Nevertheless, Henry almost certainly saw his father and Carman swing from the Castle Bridge.

In March 1784, Susannah was also committed to the gallows for the theft of goods, mainly clothing and silverware, to the value of 52/-. Aged 19 years she was also reprieved and sentenced to transportation for 14 years.

In the gaol Henry and Susannah became lovers and she bore Henry a son, later baptized in the colony with his sister Diana on 5th December, 1788, as Henry. Their pleas to marry were refused by the prison governor. When the First Fleet assembled at Portsmouth, Sussanah and two other convict women were escorted by a turnkey, John Simpson to the transport "Charlotte". The Captain refused to take the baby on board because he lacked papers. The child was taken from his distraught mother's arms and left with Simpson. Simpson, a kindly man, rushed to London to the home of Lord Sydney, Home Secretary, who after listening to the case, ordered that the child be reunited with his mother and Henry be sent on the same ship as Sussanah. Further he ordered that the couple be permitted to marry. Although the latter order was not adhered to, Henry and Sussanah and their child were reunited on the transport "Friendship". The story aroused so much interest in the London papers and a collection was made to purchase items for the young couple. The goods including clothing and books was entrusted to Captain Sinclair

of the "Alexander". More of the parcel later.

On the voyage to the Cape although sexes were segregated, Henry and Sussanah had opportunities to see each other. Henry apparently had the freedom of the ship, helping the sailors. In Lieut. Clark's journal dated 12th December 1778, he writes "Cable (an earlier spelling) two of the prisoners who have liberty of going about the ship had stolen Beef --- I will keep a sharp look after them when at Botany Bay otherwise they will steal the teeth out of my head". At the Cape the women convicts on the "Friendship" were transferred to other ships. Susannah to the "Charlotte", to make room for stock.

The Rev. Richard Johnson, who had espoused the cause of the couple, informed each of the welfare of each other for the remainder of the voyage.

At Botany Bay, Kable was transferred to the "Supply" with three other convicts. It is claimed that Kable, a giant of a man, carried Governor Phillip ashore from the longboat at Sydney Cove. Although this legend is not documented, my great grandmother, Henry's granddaughter, told the story to my mother on a number of occasions.

On 10th February 1788, the first marriages in the Colony took place. Henry's and Susannah's being the third in the register. As the first two marriages apparently did not produce traceable descendants, the large family of Kable was truly the Colony's first family. They lived in a tent adjacent to the Governor's tent-house and early in 1789 Henry was in charge of Phillip's vegetable garden. The marriage was marred for Sussanah as the parcel of goods had been plundered and a dress she had hoped to wear was missing. In the first civil action in the Colony on 1st July 1788, Kable successfully sued Captain Sinclair and was granted 15 compensation. Interestingly this sum exceeded the value of the goods they were accused of stealing. Thus Henry became the first convict to acquire money.

In December Diana and brother Henry Jnr. were baptized. Later in 1809 she married William Guadry in the first marriage at St. Philip's Church, being the first born Australian to reach maturity. Another son, John, became Australia's first prize fighter.

By 1791 Kable was overseer of the watch. In 1794 he was appointed Chief Constable and Gaoler to the Colony. In 1802 he was dismissed from the position for importing pigs on a Government wharf for his own use. Later he built his own wharf at Parramatta which town was also served by the first stage coach also owned by Kable. On his dismissal he built a three storey mansion near the old gaol site.

He received an unconditional pardon in 1796 along with grant of 30 acres at Petersham, and shortly after a further 15 acres. About this time he became licensee of the "Rampling Horse" one of Sydney's finest inns of the time. Kable had already entered into a shipbuilding partnership with James Underwood. Together they built the "Contest" off 44 tons, the first ocean going ship in the Colony. By 1805 the firm had expanded considerably, with the addition of Simeon Lord as a partner. Kable and Co. also entered the Bass Straight sealing trade, as well as being importers of note, owning some 25 vessels.

By 1810 Henry had retired to Windsor leaving Henry Jnr. to take over his father's trading interests and captaining his ships on numerous trading missions. Kable had by now built a large home and brewery in Kable St. Windsor and amassed large farming interests. During his career, Kable owned a total of some one thousand acres. He died on 16th March 1846 aged 84. Susannah had predeceased him in 1825. He was buried in the family vault at St. Matthews, Windsor, where other members of his large family are at rest.

From the squalor of Norwich, the young couple had travelled across the world to the desolate penal settlement to become leading and prosperous citizens. It is their lives which was celebrated at their 200th Wedding Anniversary at the Regent Hotel on the site of Henry's Sydney mansion, on 13th February, 1988.

FROM THE MAILBOX Shirley Beale, Member writes from Kent, England. 5-2-1989

We have been very busy with research into the Beale family to date and as they now have a more organised format here in England. I thought to write and let you know so that the information could be available to members who may be coming to England. The main thing is the introduction of Readers Tickets, which we found to be and excellent idea, as once obtained one can go from one records office to another with identification which saves a lot of messing

about and establishes one as a bonafide researcher and one is therefore treated in a much more professional manner. The tickets are free and for a period of four years. Rules change slightly from County to County.

It would be wise for any interested person to bring two small passport photos with them as we had quite some fun getting ours here. We had to resort to those awful photo cubicles which for 1 pound will produce four unrecognisable photos of oneself, disguised as criminals.

Research is now big business here, now much busier than our last visit and this

is really the off season for overseas visitors. In some places equipment and table space has to be booked in advance or is either first come first served, which sees us up in the dark and off in the half light and what they call "raw grey" weather to get on with the job. I think we are both becoming quite expert at finding our own way around and sniffing out information. It is very exciting really sorting through transcripts which may date from as early as 1550.

I find the social history involved absolutely fascinating and especially the details given in say 1550 to early this century. It is also exciting some of the handwritten books which one sees being examined by other people. The ways name changes occur, generally by the way the person thought it should be spelt thus Beale could be Beal, Seal or Heale and by the subsequent transcriber who may not correctly identify the ancient handwriting if they were not very expert in that field. Much of the transcriptions have been done by lay people in local parishes therefore one must be very flexible and if possible call for the original document. We have another six weeks of this so here's hoping we'll find lots of interesting things. Quite honestly one could spend a lifetime doing research on so many subjects besides one's own family.

We have been to Battle Abbey, near Hastings where the Battle of Hastings was fought in 1066. We actually walked over the battle field, now grazing pastures for sheep. The Abbey, was built by William on the sight of the battle and it is reputed that the high alter stood exactly where Harold fell. It was a beautiful place until Henry VIII wanted to bed Anne Boleyn and thus in the rise of the C of E the Abbey was sacked and destroyed in 1538. Henry had quite a year as Winchester Cathedral which was damaged the same year and not restored until late last Century. Winchester is 900 years old or more, we visited there on Friday and last Sunday Dover Castle and Bodiam Castle.

As you can see it is now three weeks later and much research has flowed under the bridge. We have been travelling to various areas. Last week Bath to see the FFF plaque on Phillips grave, that was a must, and to research Phillip Shewring. Bath is a beautiful city even in the winter and well worth a visit. At the archives we were able to read their file on Arthur Phillip which was very interesting in more ways than one. We have now been to CRO's at Sussex, Kent, Surry, Hampshire, Wiltshire, Essex, Herefordshire, Somerset, plus Bath City Record Office, PRO's London and Kew, St. Catherine's House, Census Office, Portugal Street, Society of Friends and the SOG.

We attempted to communicate with the Australian Heritage Centre, Isle of Wight to no avail. The information centre in Portsmouth had never heard of it even though its marked on the map. That needs to be clarified as to when it does open, days times etc as we had intended to make a visit there as a matter of priority, as well other members may wish to from time to time. Another thing of interest here, is Urban Archaeology. With rebuilding of certain areas they are now finding all sorts of goodies from their past. Developers here now have to pay for research of an area before they can redevelop and are even employing archaeologists themselves to handle the situation. I tell you this because I think it is a great idea and could be applied to Australia.

SYDNEY MARITIME MUSEUM JONATHAN KING



SUNDAY 23rd JULY, 1989 - 2pm - 5pm.

Jonathan King will addressing members and friends at the Sydney Maritime Museum, on board the historic ferry, "Kanangra", at Darling Harbour on Sunday 23rd July, 1989. His subject - "The First Fleet Re-enactment Voyage" - a subject dear to the hearts of all First Fleeters.

This will be an exciting and interesting day, as we not only have Jonathan King's fascinating talk, but inspections of the ships of the Sydney Maritime Museum - "The Sydney Seaport".

The Sydney Maritime Museum is dedicated to the preservation of historic vessels and some of the ships open for inspection include the partially restored "James Craig", one of the last sailing ships which plied the trading routes between England and Australia. She rounded the dreaded Cape Horn 28 times and travelled virtually all corners of the globe.

For inspection also is "The Krait", an ex-Chinese junk commissioned in World War II, which was involved in a raid on Singapore Harbour with a group of Australian commandos, and destroyed units of the Japanese merchant fleet before successfully returning to base. "The Krait" is featured in the TV mini-series.

The ferry "Kanangra" is the only remaining example of the first generation of steel hulled, double-ended screw ferries which worked Sydney Harbour.

Admission is from 2pm, and Jonathan King will be speaking on board the "Kanangra", at 3pm, followed by afternoon tea, and more time to inspect the ships.
