

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

**H**is Excellency the Governor and Mrs Samuels will be our guests at the Fellowship's Australia Day luncheon in January. There is a notice of that event in this issue of the Newsletter, and I would advise you to reserve your place now as numbers are limited.

The AGM of the Fellowship was held at First Fleet House on 1 November last. The Executive as nominated was returned, but the warning signs are up, that if we do not get an infusion of new blood on the Executive, the future does not look bright for the Fellowship. Personally I am prepared, if the Fellowship wishes, to lead our organisation into the new millennium, and by then you will be probably seeking a new President, a new Treasurer and four or more Executive members. Roy Morris, our Treasurer, with vital help from his deputy Cec Thompson, both hope that some member will step into the breach and take responsibility for this very important position. I know that some of our members in country areas would dearly love to be part of the Executive – I am thinking especially of one very dedicated 'genie' and First Fleeter who would be a wonderful asset to the Fellowship – sorry Robyn, you are too far away at Coffs Harbour!

I am amazed at the number of new members who do all of that research, pay their initial dues and annual subscription, receive a rather special certificate, then never give the Fellowship another thought. Please we need not only your interest, passing as it may be, but especially Sydney folk – we need your help, if we are to survive past the year 2001.

I have had quite a number of speaking engagements in the last two months. The Seniors Club at Carlingford had 120 members all attentive to the history of the First Fleet and the exceptional story of some First Fleeters. There were at least four or five descendants in the audience. Later I spoke to Eastwood Rotary and Abbotsford View Club. Again both very receptive to our message.

The Sydney/Portsmouth Sister City Committee has been somewhat reformed by the City Council. I feel that the relationship between the two cities is purely historical and possibly far from

economical. I cannot help feeling that these Sister City relationships are a case of 'you scratch my back, I'll scratch yours!' We have an incredible historic relationship with Portsmouth which transcends any future material gain whatsoever. However, in the newly organised committee of ten persons, I am still your representative. At the last meeting of this body, having been told by the powers that be, that the Bonds of Friendship will not return to their original site, I requested that the F.F.F. would in that case prefer the Bonds to be replaced in First Fleet Park.

I was reminded by one member in my broadcast over 2CBFM that I may have been incorrect re Robert Williams in recording that Jim Payne was the catalyst in that the F.F.F. recognised his descendants as First Fleeters. Looking back in the records, it was Associate Member Les Butcher in conjunction with Member Keith Smith who brought the descendants of Robert Williams into the Fellowship. It was Canon Jim Payne who corresponded with the Executive re a plaque on the Williams grave at Richmond. I first came into contact with Jim when I was a Church Warden of St James's King Street, Sydney. Neither of us in those days realised that we had inherited, as the family of Anne Forbes called, 'A Rich Inheritance.'

November 1998 was a year in which at least two of our members celebrated a Golden Wedding anniversary. Congratulations to Vi Knight (FF Bartholomew Reardon) and her husband Stan, and also to Joan Cox (FF Henry Kable and Sussanah Holmes) and husband Bill.

For some years now Betty Parsons has been our calligrapher for our Fellowship certificates. The Executive appreciates the work Betty has put in over the years for the Fellowship. Due to personal family reasons Betty wishes to relinquish responsibly for calligraphy work on our certificates. Her sister Val Flanders for a number of years helped. Both are very proud descendants of FF Robert Forrester. NOW have we anyone out

## COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE SERVICE, ST JOHN'S CEMETERY, PARRAMATTA

On Sunday, 29 November 1998, a Fellowship of First Fleeters plaque was affixed on the gate pillar at the entrance to St John's Cemetery, Parramatta. As a bicentennial project in 1988 the Fellowship of First Fleeters installed nineteen commemorative plaques at burial sites in New South Wales, Norfolk Island, and Tasmania in memory of First Fleeters recorded as being buried at these sites, it was not at that time able to put a covering plaque for all unidentified burial plots. But earlier this year the St John's Cemetery Trust gave its approval to have a plaque installed.

The wording on the plaque is as follows:

THIS PLAQUE IS DEDICATED TO THE MEMORY OF  
THOSE WHO CAME  
TO THIS COUNTRY WITH CAPTAIN ARTHUR PHILLIP  
IN THE  
FIRST FLEET IN 1788 AND WHO WERE BURIED IN  
THIS PLACE  
FELLOWSHIP OF FIRST FLEETERS  
1998

Mollie Gillen, in her book 'Founders of Australia,' identifies over sixty-four First Fleeters buried at St John's Cemetery, Parramatta. The Fellowship has only been able to find the burial sites of sixteen First Fleeters with tombstones on which to attach a memorial plaque. An Australian flag was put on each known tombstone for easy identification on the day.

The dedication service commenced with President Peter Christian welcoming those in attendance to the function.

John McClymont, President of the Parramatta Historical Society, then spoke giving a brief history of the cemetery, identifying a number of notable people buried there. He then lifted the Queen Anne Flag covering the plaque on the gate pillar. The troops from the Australian Colonial Marine Enactment group gave the salute.

The Rev Peter Kemp from St John's Cathedral, Parramatta, then read the dedication prayer. The service was concluded with the Australian Marine Enactment group firing a trio of salutes in memory of all First Fleeters buried in this place.

St John's Cemetery has the largest number of First Fleeters buried anywhere. The Fellowship has placed sixteen memorial plaques on tombstones of First Fleeters in a total of six visitations to this cemetery.

The first visit was on 21 March 1976 when a plaque was placed on the tombstone of First Fleeter Henry Dodd. Henry Dodd died 28 January 1791. The tombstone is the oldest memorial in the cemetery.

The second visit was on Sunday, 12 March 1978. Plaques were placed on the tombstones of Augustus

Alt, died 9 January 1815; Thomas Eccles, died 2 April 1814; William Elliott, died 19 April 1832; John Herbert, died 1 April 1832; Herbert's wife Deborah (Ellam) Herbert, died 3 June 1819; David Killpack, died 30 November 1797, and John Palmer, died 27 September 1833. Most of these First Fleeters had descendants in attendance who read the eulogy for their famous ancestors

The third visit was on Sunday, 13 May 1984, and was to have plaques placed on the tombstones of Hugh Hughes, died 3 March 1830; Isaac Knight, died 17 April 1842; Jane (Poole) McManus, died 26 November 1826, and James Wright, died 15 October 1825. Again, descendants read the eulogy for their First Fleeter ancestors.

The fourth visit was on 14 January 1991 when plaques were placed on the tombstones of Mary (Dykes) Kelly, died 10 November 1839, and Christopher Palmer, died 12 April 1891. Betty Loneragan from the Palmer Family Association read the eulogy for Christopher Palmer.

The fifth visit was on Sunday 21 January 1996 when a plaque was placed on the tombstone of Frances Hannah Clements and dedicated and the eulogy was read by a member of the Arndell Family Association. Frances was born to Elizabeth Burleigh on 21 January 1788 and therefore could be identified as the youngest First Fleeter.

The sixth visit was on Sunday, 19 July 1988, and a plaque was dedicated for First Fleeter John Martin, died 19 December 1837, on the tombstone of his wife Mary (Randall) Martin and their daughter Henrietta

This is the twentieth commemorative plaque the Fellowship has had installed at cemeteries in memory of First Fleeters buried in those places for which there is no tombstone or the actual burial site is not known.



## THE GREEN HILLS BURIAL GROUNDS

The Fellowship of First Fleeters has accepted an invitation from the Hawkesbury Historical Society to install a commemorative plaque on its plinth at the Green Hills Burial Grounds, Windsor, on Sunday, 7 March 1999. Starting time 3.00pm.

In June 1997 the Fellowship attended the consecration of the Burial Grounds as a guest of the society with our President, Peter Christian, unveiling the Queen Ann flag draped over the plinth.

The area is located on land fronting South Creek, to the south-west of the Jolly Frog hotel in Bridge Street, Windsor. The grounds can be seen as you travel north along Windsor Road and as you cross 'Fitzroy Bridge' before turning into Macquarie Street at the lights.



Mollie Gillen in her book *Founders of Australia* identifies at least thirty-six First Fleeters buried in the Windsor area and as this site is the first known cemetery in the area many of them may be buried there.

Councillor Dr Rex Stubbs, President Hawkesbury Historical Society and Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council, will be in attendance and a number of Members of Parliament have been invited.

The Hawkesbury City Council is establishing a path through the grounds along South Creek, under Fitzroy Bridge, past Tebbutts Observatory to Thompson's Square.

This will be the twenty-first commemorative plaque which has been dedicated to the memory of First Fleeters buried nearby, without any known tombstone and/or identification monument.

## NORFOLK REVISITED

Peter Hibbs's Betty Warn (#6110) stood with a feeling of great pride on the deck of Vampire watching the replica of Norfolk berth at Darling Harbour.

Betty reports: My First Fleet ancestor, Peter Hibbs, was the master of the original Norfolk when Bass and Flinders circumnavigated Tasmania. Flinders named several places in Tasmania after Peter, the only crew member to be so honoured.

The first Norfolk was a twenty-five ton sloop built on Norfolk Island from Norfolk pine. Its purpose was to ferry farm produce to Sydney and to improve communication between the Island and Sydney. This did not happen because the ship was used instead by Bass and Flinders.

The new Norfolk is a beautifully built ship of Tasmanian pine and is a wonderful tribute to our early sailors.

On 11 October I again went to Darling Harbour to see the tiny ship set out on the reenactment of the circumnavigation of Tasmania. The crew were dressed in the seaman's uniform of the day. Captain Bern Cuthbertson looked splendid in navy blue with gold braid. Over 200 hours of work went into the creation of the uniforms.


At 2.00pm Norfolk was sculled out of Darling Harbour and the 'Great Adventure' began.

I was on board the ferry Reliance which followed Norfolk under the Harbour Bridge, past the Opera House to Fort

Denison. There was a carnival atmosphere on board and a great number of photos were taken.

As I watched the tiny ship sail down harbour to the Heads and the open sea I thought of the original voyage 200 years ago and the courageous crew who sailed into unknown waters.

God speed and a safe return to Bern and his crew!



## JOHN AND MARY SMALL DESCENDANTS ASSOCIATION

The Small Descendants Association wants to place on record its appreciation and thanks to retiring Vice-President John Pollock for his contribution to the workings of the association. John was the first President of the Small Descendants Association in 1971. He was responsible for the production of the family book 'The Small Family in Australia 1788 - 1988' published in the bicentennial year of 1988. Although he had many helpers in collecting and collating the multitude of names, it was John Pollock who spent many hours entering the information on the computer; having the book edited and printed. John Pollock was also responsible for having the family exhibition changed from a well-meaning amateur production to a professional and orderly exhibition.

John Pollock retired from the association after the bicentennial celebrations only to come back in 1994 to bring out an updated information book of 'The Small Family in Australia' for distribution and sale at the family's annual reunion in 1995. John did not stand for election at this year's annual

meeting. The new Vice-President is Douglas Small. Doug Small has also been associated with the Small Descendants Association since its

inception in 1971. John Pollock in response to the thanks for his efforts for the association, from President Janice Thomas, at the 1998 annual meeting expressed the view that he was confident that the association will continue for many years.

The association is on a program of collecting new and forgotten family names for possibly another update book in 2001. It is seeking the cooperation and help on this subject from descendants of First Fleeters John and Mary Small. It is also seeking names for the mailing list so that these people can be invited to the family reunion on Sunday, 10 October 1999, at St Anne's, Ryde, and for future years. The Small Descendants Association is looking into the production of a family crest. The idea is to have it placed on mugs and other objects for sale as a fund-raising promotion.
