# President's report

The toast of the day to *The Day We Celebrate* was given by your President and ended on a wonderful note by Rod's wife, Dr Louise Bauer, 'pianiste extroadinaire', leading us to the singing of our National Anthem.

The day was completed by the Fellowship's PR officer, Pamela Hempel, overseeing the draw of the raffle. On behalf of the Executive may I express sentiments of gratitude for all who particlpated in this raffle, whilst understanding for personal reasons why some members abstained from participating. You will notice in this issue that the Executive has organised, through Pam Quick, a number of day excursions, some of which are extremely relevant to First Fleeters. I commend these to you!

The house was built for John Macarthur, who unfortunately died before it was completed. The family has continued to live there, and the National Trust calls it 'probably the most important country home in Australia'. 'The fact it has always been lived in by the family means it's packed with all the old possessions and fittings, so it's a bit like a treasure trove,' says sixth-generation Macarthur family member, Edwina Macarthur-Stanham.

The house is painstakingly maintained as a 19th century country manor, with antique furniture, many portraits of the Macarthurs, old books and a massive sandstone cellar.

There will be tours of the house by the family, and there is a massive garden with Australia's oldest camellia.

The grounds are suitable for picnics. Plenty of parking.

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
# First Fleeters Celebrate THE DAY

## Australia Day Presentations

### PRESIDENT'S TOAST 'THE DAY WE CELEBRATE'

On the 26th January, 215 years ago, some 732 convicts together with 245 marines and a complement of Naval personnel arrived in Sydney Cove. One third of the convicts were female and I thought that it would be of interest to members if I dwelt somewhat on our matriarchs for once.

The diaries of Lieutenant Ralph Clark, marine on Friendship, continually harp on his dislike of the female convicts, although he was not loath to take one as a companion later!

Having arrived at Cape Town he noted in his diary, with regard to the 30 sheep taken on board quarters vacated by the female convicts ... 'I think we will find them more agreeable shipmates than the women were'!

On 6th February 1788, Surgeon Arthur Bowes-Smyth noted in his diary in regard to the disembarkation of the female convicts 'We had long wished for the pleasure of seeing them leave the ship. They were dressed, in general, very clean and some amongst them could have been said to have been well-dressed.' But he went on to record a night of debauchery! By 1797 things had settled somewhat. It is of interest to note that with many of the so-called recalcitrant convicts it did take some time for them to realise, that in this new environment, a new beginning could be made. So in his report to Lord Sydney, the second Governor of the Colony John Hunter, wrote: 'The vast number of women for whom we have little work are a vast weight on the stores of government, but, if we estimate their

merits by the charming children with which they have filled the Colony, then they deserve our care.'

Bearing these sentiments in mind some two centuries later, Dr Portia Robinson of the History Department of Macquarie University noted in her book, *The Hatch and Brood of Time*, that these children of the First Fleeters, the so-called currency lads and lasses, were emerging as a remarkably honest, sober and industrious law-abiding group of men and women.

The first generation of First Fleeters were coming into their own. Dr Craig Smee in his book First Fleet Families of Australia notes, and I quote, 'Whatever the circumstances of their arrival the First Fleeters planted a seed of the native born, who soon acquired a character which was both different in nature from their origins in England, but similar to each other in their newly adopted land. A character such as self-reliance, initiative and, of course, from both parents also, a distinct accent emerged.'

One would hope that some time in the future an in-depth study may be made of the female convicts of the First Fleet, it would make interesting reading and, more importantly, would confound the efforts of some politically correct detractors of the First Fleet!

So we gather here today to honour the first European arrivals in this land. Their deeds are indelibly etched into the history of this our nation from its very birthpangs. Their descendants have enriched our heritage and we remember them all with pride.

Would you please charge your glasses and join with me in the toast: The day we celebrate! Advance Australia Fair. The Australia Day Guest Speaker has provided a brief history of the building in which the Female Orphan School was housed.

### THE FEMALE ORPHAN SCHOOL 1813-1887

The foundation stone for the Female Orphan School was laid by Governor Macquarie in 1813. The three storey building was an adaptation of Elizabeth Macquarie's family home 'Airds', in Appin, Scotland. The inscription on the pediment of the main building reads: Female Orphan Institution erected under the Superintendence of the Rev. S. Marsden 1814 L. Macquarie Governor. The orphanage was fully funded by the colonial government.

The first pupils arrived in 1818 and by 1829 there were 152 girls in a building designed for 100. Many of the children had one parent living. They came from all sections of colonial society - the children of convicts, children orphaned during the long voyage to Australia and even Aboriginal children referred to the orphanage by colonial clergymen and magistrates. Girls received a basic education and were apprenticed as domestic servants at thirteen.

When the Male Orphan School at Cabramatta (Bonnyrigg) was closed in 1850, the Protestant boys were admitted to Rydalmere and the orphanage was renamed the Protestant Orphan School. In 1873 there were 148 boys and 92 girls in the school. Changes in Government policy from 1881 favoured placing orphaned children with families and the Protestant Orphan School closed in 1886.

### THE PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITAL 1888-1985

Patients from the overcrowded Parramatta Hospital for the Insane were moved into the Orphan School buildings at Rydalmere in 1888. New wards were built during the 1890s and new theories for the treatment of the mentally ill were reflected in open building designs and landscaping associated with the new dormitories built about 1900. During the 1930s additions were made to a number of buildings. New wards were erected in 1949. A decade later, 1959-1964, saw substantial new facilities constructed.

By the 1970s medicines offered the means to control many symptoms of mental ill-health without requiring institutional care while changing philosophies emphasised community integration rather than isolation. There was no longer a role for large institutions such as Rydalmere and it gradually closed down between 1985-89.

Australian Historical Society. This event has been published on their website for some time. I received a phone call from FM Radio 99.3 requesting an on-line interview about my forthcoming speech. I quickly put him right and proceeded to give a historically correct run down on the First Fleet. It was a good interview, but I am always on tenterhooks when being interviewed on radio or TV. I well remember being 'set up' in 1988 by a TV station from the UK relaying a program to that country from Taronga Zoo of all places. I found myself seated between two Aboriginal activists who had their say. When it was my turn, the interviewer asked me what I thought of the racial questions in Australia from the view point of descendants of the First Fleet. My answer was 'no comment as it was not relevant'! That was certainly a waste of time.

The Rev Barry Marsh, FF Robert Forrester, in sending a sizable donation to the Fellowship on 17 January last, wrote that he intended to sail from the Bass and Flinders wharf at San Souci, Botany Bay, and 'cruise through its heads to Sydney Harbour and up to the Opera House to join in the ferries race and the big sailships'. In doing this he said that he would be tracing the steps of his fourth great grandfather, Robert Forrester who made the trip, albeit at George III's expense, 215 years ago. We hope, Barry, that you enjoyed the day!

On 16 January member Jim Payne, and his spouse Joan, celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary in Canberra. Jim, who was at one time the Anglican Dean of Perth and General Secretary of the Bible Society is a very proud descendant of Robert Williams FF. Jim junior, in his email to me, noted that his parents had been a source of remarkable blessing and great pride over the years. I would personally add my AMEN to those sentiments as Jim regularly keeps in touch.

I look forward to the coming year in the hope that our Fellowship will continue to grow in strength.
