The giant steel dish of the Parkes Radio Telescope is a landmark in the paddocks just north of Parkes and a landmark in the scientific history of Australia. Used by astronomers to study galaxies, exploding stars, pulsars and quasars near the edge of the universe, the telescope was used in conjunction with Apollo 11 Moon landings, Apollo 13 rescue, and explorations of Jupiter, Uranus, Neptune and Haley's Comet. It is the world's

most powerful single dish radio telescope. You will return to Parkes where you will visit the War Memorial. It is located on Memorial Hill from which there is a 360-degree view overlooking Parkes and surrounding areas. Morning tea will be at the Parkes Tourist Centre.

Your coach will then journey south to the beautiful historical township of Forbes, just 32 kilometres from Parkes. Forbes is rich in the history of Australia's growth and is the resting place of the notorious bushranger Ben Hall.

After a stop at the Forbes Railway Arts and Tourist Centre, situated at the 100-year-old Forbes Historical Railway Station, you will enjoy lunch in Forbes. You will then be taken on a tour of Forbes, which last century was the Cobb and Co coach stop. The coaches of Cobb and Co carried gold from there to various destinations. In the early 1860s because of extremely active bushrangers, tunnels were constructed linking the coach stop, now the Albion Hotel, and the various banks where the gold was deposited. The tunnels were used to transport gold and money to and from the banks to avoid robberies, which were frequent in the streets.

You will then return to Parkes and, if time permits, a leisurely walk in the Parkes Shopping Centre, prior to returning to the Parkview for dinner

DAY 4

WELLINGTON

Today you will visit Wellington via Molong. Morning Tea will be at picturesque Wellington Park. You will then travel to The Angora Tourist Farm, incorporating the Alpaca Farm, at Yeoval, about 25 kilometres from Wellington. There seeing is believing, there is nothing like this anywhere else in Australia. The award winning tourist

farm is an experience you won't forget. It is a 2000acre wheat, sheep and cattle property, which incorporates a fine tourist attraction. You will see unique angora rabbits and one being shorn. You will see how the fleece is spun on an old fashioned spinning wheel.

You will see numerous farm



animals on this working property. You will enjoy a traditional woolshed Bar-B-Q lunch, during which there will be live entertainment.

Then browse through the souvenir shop where angora, alpaca, crocodile, emu and woollen products are on sale. On the return we will call in to the Lavender Farm for a brief visit. Your coach will then return to the Parkview for some relaxation time prior to dinner.

Road Builders MEMORIAL

Following the establishment of the penal colony in Sydney in 1788, the first major engineering project undertaken was the building of a road across the Blue Mountains to Bathurst. This followed the exploits of Blaxland, Wentworth and Lawson in 1813. History tells us of the hundreds of convicts who toiled with pick, shovel and sledgehammer to create this road. God knows of the hardships and privations they endured.

The sandstone mountains with its steep grades, the winter weather and we believe harsh treatment were their lot. Early sketches show the gangs lined up clean-shaven but in leg irons.

My life's ambition is to build a permanent monument to the road builders. I envisage a group of figures including two convicts, a soldier and two aborigines surrounded by mountain sandstone. The figures would be 1.5 times life size, cast in bronze.

Terrance Plowright from Wentworth Falls is a highly skilled sculptor whose work includes the Brolgas at Darling Harbour and the Driller at Cobar.

The RTA has authenticated a section of Cox's original road at Leura on the Great Western Highway where there is plenty of room to construct the memorial to the convicts. We estimate 10 bus bays 20 car spaces, toilets and shelter would be needed.

We have researched the formation of a prescribed private fund or trust account, for taxation purposes, we have opened a bank account, we have appointed a researcher Susan Franks (email systems@mail.lisp.com.au) to confirm the list of names of over 200 convicts who worked on the road.

We have secured 20 original convict bricks, with handmade Frogs in them, and asked a brick company to make replicas, the idea being to construct a pioneer family wall. From these bricks, (suitably inscribed with the ancestors name the ship and date of arrival on them.) and to sell these in order to pay for the memorial.

My purpose in writing to you is to ask you if you have a list of names of convicts who may have worked on this road and their crime, ship, arrival date and where they are buried. Also, a list of First Fleeters or pioneer families that may be interested in helping us get bring this project to fruition.

I am hoping to make it a Rotary centennial project for 2005, I have pledged \$100,000 towards it, Terrance has started modelling the figures and we hope to have an official launch in September 2004.



This monument will link Australians with their past and as far as I know this is the only proposal to honour the builders of the original road. We need to pay tribute to our ancestors.

REMINISCENCES OF AUSTRALIA

'Soon after were gathered the criminals under the military authority, who commenced operations under Lapstone Hill, where the present road through the Blue Mountains to Bathurst now runs. There were something like a thousand men, with two hundred soldiers over them, with Williams and Brooton as overseers, who remained as such until the road was formed to Mount Victoria, and thence to Bathurst. And now come the terrors of the poor unfortunate criminals; a stockade was formed on the spot where the burial ground, church, and school-house now stand. Rayner's factory was the old soldier's barracks. In the centre of the stockade were fixed the triangles, where the lash was administered daily; the yells of the poor unfortunate wretches would have melted a heart of stone, and no human being to soothe or speak a word of kindness, to prevent, perhaps the prospect of being sent to Tasmania or Norfolk Island, even though they were fortunate enough to escape a cruel death in the Blue Mountains.

Williams, the overseer, was subsequently killed by a prisoner, who rushed at him and struck him down with a spade, in revenge for being put to work on a bull-dog ant-hill. For this crime he was of course, hanged.

In close proximity to the stockade there was a place called Billibot, where the dead were buried. It was a round hole, dug out like a well, about thirty feet in circumference, and of considerable depth. The bodies were stripped, thrown in, and covered with quick lime together with some earth. This was their mode of burial.

The Correction House was well flagged and kept thoroughly washed, but was bitterly cold in winter. There were cross beams, five feet high, to which prisoners were often handcuffed all night for bad conduct. Sometimes two or three were found dead in the morning, the doctor's certificate being the only record of death. They were disposed of in the afore-mentioned manner.

Dr White, a well known medical man of Windsor and Penrith, who was the doctor the whole time (about six years), has often related the story of Billibot.

Wells, who was the butcher during that period, has often spoken of the barbarity of that awful place, now almost forgotten, perhaps not even been heard of, by the quiet and peaceful inhabitants now occupying the lands. It is indeed to be deplored that such a lovely spot should have, at any time, been polluted by such dastardly deeds as those committed by the bloodthirsty wretches who so cruelly betrayed their trust.

'But when into the earth they descended Such cruel tyranny surely ended'
