## President's report

Some 145 people attended and I was thrilled that they donated the sum of \$500 to a Tsunami Appeal. My appreciation to Stan and his wife Elaine for their hospitality to me over two days.

Member Diane Peppun, FF Ed Whitton has sent the Fellowship a CD copy of the Whitton line down through Mary White and Richard Barnes. Our appreciation to Diane, who resides in California, for this valuable addition to our computer library.

Director Jean Mortimer recently brought to my attention that a Memorial First Fleet Garden, the proposal of which appeared in *Founders* issue of January/February 2004, was to be opened this Australia Day by Dr M Cross, FF John Cross. The garden, designed by Ray Callus, FF John Cross, is situated at Wallabadah on the New England Highway some 55 kms south of Tamworth on the turn off to Quirindi. Members and friends are invited by Ray to visit the site if ever passing that way.

Mary Hope-Caten, FF Rope/Pulley, also

brought to my attention that the land in the St Marys area, where the old munitions factory was located, is now being developed as a housing estate. Whilst Mary had some concern for the wildlife fairly abundant in the area, I am sure that she and all members of the Anthony Rope and Elizabeth Pulley family would be pleased at the name of the new area Ropes Crossing.

Again, recently digging through the archives at FF House, I happened to unearth copies of some six letters written from August 1787 to July 1790 by First Fleeter Charles Cutts Ormsby. Our Librarian, Jean Mortimer, has placed them in a suitable folder and accessed them into the Fellowship Library. I have written a par on Ormsby which should appear in the next Newsletter.

I received a publication in December entitled *Ann Colpitta - First Fleet Convict Pioneer* written by descendant Tony Laffan. In his foreword, Tony states that it is a celebration of the life of Ann Colpitts ... an understatement ... it gives an insight into the lives during the early years of the colony of a number of First Fleeters. The book is available from Tony Laffan, 52a Reading Road Brighton le Sands 2216. The cost is \$12.00 cash in hand or \$15.00 to cover book, postage and handling.

Our Australia Day Festivities are reported elsewhere in this edition of *Founders* but it was a time of Fellowship on the two occasions we gathered. I must pay tribute on your behalf to not only those who participated, but to the dedicated few who laboured behind the scenes. ## North West Chapter



# The Day We Celebrate

## A TRIBUTE TO ARTHUR PHILLIP

It was the 26th January 1788, a Saturday, a temperature of 70 degrees F, a slight sou, sou east breeze and it was on this day that the destinies of Cook, Phillip, Britain and Australia were indeed brought into close association.

On the previous day, in the afternoon, Phillip had brought *Supply* to anchor in Sydney cove, with orders to Capt John Hunter to follow with the 10 remaining ships of the First Fleet on the following day. Thea Stanley Hughes, in her book *Arthur Phillip*, delves into the mind of the founder of our Nation and she writes:

'Now there was a slight pause – one night – between the sense of urgency about getting the fleet to its destination, and the new sense of urgency about the fulfilling of his destiny.'

Alan Searle wrote of Phillip in the *Australian Dictionary of Biography*:

'... steadfast in mind, modest without self-seeking, Phillip had imagination enough to conceive what the settlement might become, and the commonsense to realise what at the moment was possible and expedient. When almost everyone was complaining, he never, himself complained, when all feared disaster he could still hopefully go on with his work. He was sent out to found a convict settlement, he laid the foundations of a great dominion.'

We are told that the Governor was a slight, dark complexioned man of below medium height, quick in manner, self-controlled and courageous. He was multilingual, speaking Portuguese, Spanish, French and German. He had seen action against France during the Seven Years War, he had spent some two years with the Portuguese Navy helping them in Brazil in the Colonial War between Spain and Portugal. And also we are told that he transported a shipload of convicts from Lisbon to the Portuguese colony of Brazil.

Sally Ann Atkinson, a former Lord Mayor of Brisbane in a speech in honour of Arthur Phillip delivered at the Parish Church of St Mary le Bow in London, had some pertinent things to say.

She commenced by posing the question ... 'So why don't we know more about Phillip ... why isn't he a national hero?'

One of her reasons was that he founded a convict colony and we do not wish to be reminded of that.

Personally I would give her two out of ten for that answer. The stain of having a convict in the Family Tree was a decided minus until the 1950s.

And having dusted skeletons out of the cupboard we found that they weren't too bad at all. BUT there are some politically correct people within our community who seem extremely eager to denigrate the whole concept of European settlement of our land. The Fellowship came up against that problem in 1988 and these so called PC pseudo intellectuals are unfortunately still around, albeit a noisy minority!!!

Back to Sally Ann. Reason No 2 and, as Sally says, was especially evident in our Bicentennial Year, that Phillip's landing displaced the original inhabitants, the Aborigines. For some Australians, it was not a cause for celebration.

Five out of ten for that one.

My reply to this would have been, that during the 18th century it would have been inevitable that one of about four nations would have colonised this land. France, Holland, Spain had been fairly active in the Pacific area, and one may be forgiven in declaring that it was fortuitous to the original inhabitants of our nation that it was the British who arrived first!!

We may well ask, together with the descendants of the displaced people, many by the way have both a black and white heritage, who should take the blame? Maybe that is for future generations to work that question out.

Reason No 3. Sally Ann goes on to say that it should not be ignored that it was a historical fact that the coming of the British in 1788 led to the change and destruction of Aboriginal life.

Eight out of ten for that reason.

The First Fleeters did bring the diseases, the alcohol and more importantly an alien culture.

Regardless of this Phillip was a man of his time, and for his times he was thoughtful and sensitive.

His observations of slavery in the Portuguese colonies had instilled within him an abhorrence of the ill treatment of native peoples.

Later events have shown that there was much to answer for in respect to the authorities in the treatment of Aborigines. But ... this is the way modern Australia was founded and I think that we should all recognise the fact that it was founded on man's inhumanity to man.

On arrival it was recorded that Arthur Phillip stated that ... In this new country there will be no slavery hence, no slaves.

And ten out of ten for Sally Atkinson's last sentence: 'Phillip has never seemed a hero. He didn't look like one and he didn't behave like one. And yet for us, he was the right man in the right place.'

If it were not for him the Colony would not have lasted.

His life was gentle, and the elements so mixed in him, that nature might stand up and say to the world:

This was a man.
